The LAST deadline to apply for a CREATE grant funding to attend EMSAC 2023 is September 5, 2023.

CREATE assists private and public organizations in improving and expanding the emergency medical and trauma system in Colorado by funding education and training for emergency medical and trauma services (EMTS). Funding requires a 50% match from the requesting entity, though agencies can apply for a financial waiver to reduce the match."

Colorado ambulance services are on the verge of collapse, government report finds

A <u>draft report</u> sent to Gov. Jared Polis last week from the state's EMS Sustainability Task Force found that many of the state's emergency medical services are unsustainable, with some at risk of disappearing altogether. The 20-member task force was launched last year to address the problems over a five-year period and is made up of state lawmakers and EMS professionals. Many first responders, however, including some serving on the task force, say more urgent action has to be taken. Read more here.

Some Colorado hospitals are still struggling financially

More than three years after the start of the COVID pandemic upended the hospital business nationwide and more than six months after the budgets at hospitals across Colorado <u>really hit the skids</u>, the financial outlook still has yet to stabilize, according to first-quarter financial statements filed with federal regulators. Ambulance Deserts: Addressing Geographic Disparities in the Provision of Ambulance Services

Declining numbers of rural hospitals and ambulance services imply that remaining ambulance services are being tasked to play a greater role in delivering more sophisticated emergency services in expanded service areas, yet emergency medical services have not been systematically integrated within the healthcare delivery system. Research has shown that this lack of systems planning has led to gaps in the provision of ambulance services, exacerbated across larger geographic coverage areas. These gaps —referred to as "ambulance deserts"—are steadily increasing. Read more here.

An analysis of suicides among first responders — Findings from the National Violent Death Reporting System, 2015-2017

Introduction: First responders, including law enforcement officers (LEOs), firefighters, emergency medical services (EMS) clinicians, and public safety telecommunicators, face unique occupational stressors and may be at elevated risk for suicide. This <u>study</u> characterized suicides among first responders and identifies potential opportunities for additional data collection.

Three ways to improve your EMS agency's pediatric response

National Prehospital Pediatric Readiness Project is the leading initiative to improve prehospital care for acutely ill and injured children across the United States. The PPRP offers EMS agencies <u>support and resources</u> through the EMSC Innovation and Improvement Center and is set to launch a national assessment tool through the EMSC Data Center in 2024.

The No Surprises Act left out ground ambulances. Here's what's happening now.

"Insurance companies very often "have been under-reimbursing for critical life-saving services for quite a period of time" at rates that do not cover costs of having trained staff ready to respond to an emergency. So they turn to patients to foot the bill. This take-it-or-leave-it practice has continued even as major health insurance companies reported record profits, according to Wayne Jurecki, who serves on the board of directors for the American Ambulance Association.

AskRail gives first responders rapid access to railcar hazmat information

The Feb. 3 East Palestine, Ohio, train derailment served as a reminder that first responders across the United States need rapid and easy access to information about hazardous materials on trains passing through their jurisdictions with AskRail, a free application for first responders. 
IPSA anticipates between 8 and 12 presenters will speak during this 2-day summit, covering a variety of public safety topics. Presenters will be selected in August 2023, and case studies from first responders who had a role in a recent (2022-2023) critical incident will be prioritized. IPSA encourages 911 personnel, law enforcement, firefighters, EMS, tactical paramedics, emergency management personnel, public safety civilian personnel, healthcare professionals and allied emergency responders to attend this two-day multidiscipline, collaborative event.

RESEARCH

Braxton Morrison is a PhD candidate at Walden University, currently working on collecting data for his dissertation. Mr. Morrison is analyzing whether mental health stigma and years of service can predict attendance at critical incident stress debriefings in a nationwide study of five emergency services subgroups: law enforcement, EMS, fire, 911 telecommunicators, and death investigators.
