H.O.P.E. Certification Program Colorado-Workplace Wellbeing Summit

Join Women in Emergency Services on June 27th for the **Workplace Well-being Summit** at the American Mountaineering Center in Golden, Colorado from 8:30-3:30. The Helping Our Heroes Act

May 5, 2023 Rep. Marc Molinaro (R-NY) and Ann Kuster (D-NH) introduced H.R. 3104, the Helping Our Heroes Act. This bill would establish an "above the line" tax deduction for the time volunteer emergency responders donate to their communities. The Act allows volunteer emergency responders, including firefighters, ambulance services, civil air patrol and search and rescue services, to treat each hour of service or training as a \$20 charitable contribution for the purpose of a tax deduction. This deduction would be available for up to 300 hours per year. Additionally, this deduction would be an above-the-line deduction, meaning that even those who don't normally itemize their tax returns would still be eligible for this deduction.

ReportStruckBy.com: A national database for roadway responders to report struck-by incidents

ReportStruckBy.com has been operational for over a year, and ERSI is receiving submissions to the database on a regular basis. All roadway responders should report struck-by incidents to **ReportStruckBy.com**, whether that incident resulted in death, injury, or property damage. Reporting is anonymous with an option to provide contact information for follow-up by ReponderSafety.com. The reporting form takes approximately 3-4 minutes to complete.

Paramedic educational program attrition accounts for significant loss of potential EMS workforce

Recent concerns for the strength and stability of the emergency medical services (EMS) workforce have fueled interest in enhancing the entry of EMS clinicians into

the workforce. However, the educational challenges associated with workforce entry remain unclear. Our objective was to evaluate the educational pathway of entry into the EMS workforce and to identify factors that lead to the loss of potential EMS clinicians. Read more here.

California hospital wait-time advocacy

Firefighter/paramedics from throughout the state tell the story of dangerously long delays at hospital ERs waiting for the hospital to accept patients. Ambulances are getting stuck -- often for hours at a time, often in hospital corridors waiting "on the wall." These delays are a threat to patient care at the hospital and mean longer response times for critical patients needing an ambulance. AB 40 would force hospitals to meet a standard for offload times, ensuring that ambulances and paramedics can be back in the field responding to emergencies. Watch the advocacy video here.

MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES FOR EMERGENCY RESPONDERS

Path4EMS: Colorado's EMS Peer Assistance Program
